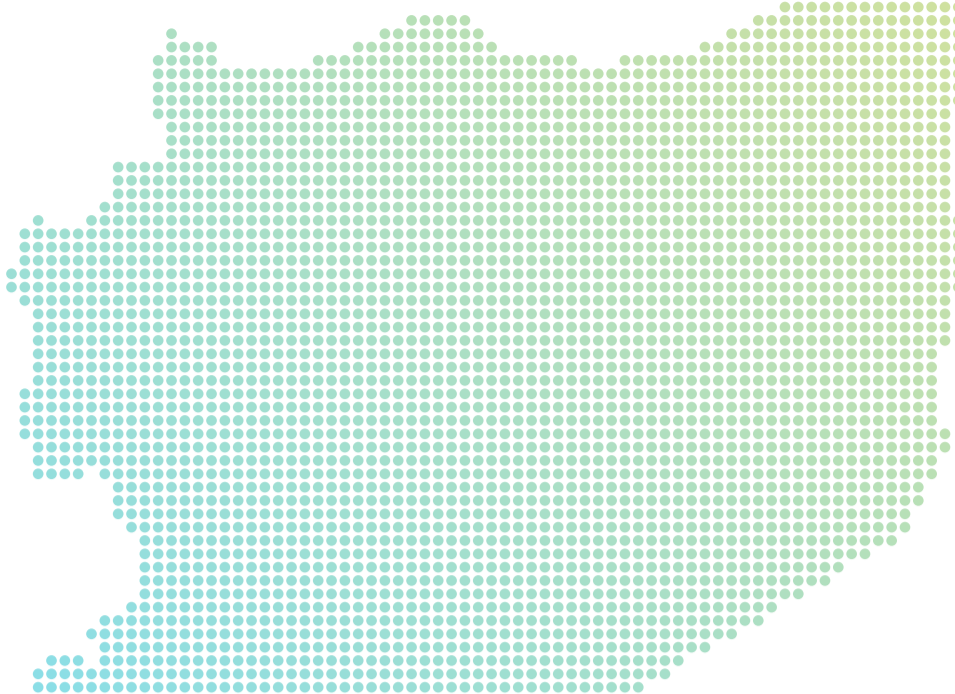
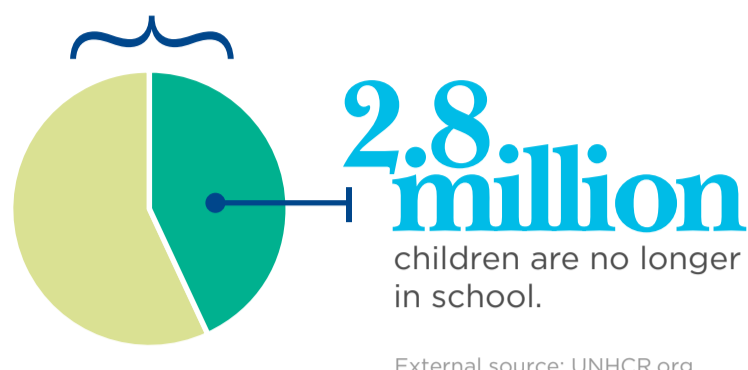


EDUCATION FOR SYRIAN REFUGEE CHILDREN TO AVOID A

**CRS IN THE FIELD**



In Egypt, CRS provides grants that pay for tuition, school supplies and equipment, and teacher salaries benefitting thousands of Syrian children.



In Jordan, CRS works with partners to recruit volunteer teachers or others with experience from the local community to teach pre-school aged children near the Syrian border.



In Lebanon, CRS and the Good Shepherd Sisters provide basic education and recreational activities to Syrian children living in tent camps.
