Integrated solutions to sustainably reduce chronic malnutrition

In 2014, CRS launched the USAID-funded Amashiga Program in consortium with six other actors to improve child nutrition across the entire Muyinga Province. To sustainably reduce malnutrition, the program works at all levels, including shifting individual hygiene behaviors, strengthening couples' joint decision-making on children's health, increasing communities' agricultural production, and reinforcing provincial early warning systems. In 2017, CRS leveraged private funds to launch a complementary intervention targeting coffee farmers in Muyinga and works to make a direct link between increased coffee production and improved household nutrition.

Responding with critical relief to emergencies

CRS leverages its global expertise in emergencies to respond to flooding, regional conflict and epidemics in Burundi. In addition to integrating Ebola readiness within on-going programming, CRS Burundi promotes recovery by strengthening displaced communities' access to safe and adequate shelter. In 2018, CRS Burundi piloted the Cash and Asset Transfer (CAT) platform, a webbased tool that ensures transparency and empowers participants with cash transfers that gives them the choice on how they spend this money. CAT facilitated the registration of 750

vulnerable households and the distribution of nearly US \$50,000 in food assistance through electronic vouchers. This technology strengthens CRS' capacity to conduct real-time data analysis and remotely ensure program quality during emergencies.

Social cohesion and gender mainstreaming

Since the launch of the USAID-funded Dukire Tubane Project in 2017, CRS has adapted its signature 3B's approach (binding, bonding & bridging) to strengthen social cohesion amongst youth and local authorities following the 2015 electoral violence. CRS' established experience in peacebuilding also informs emergency programming, eases tensions during reintegration and ensures the "do no harm" principle is upheld. Household-level conflict has been reduced through implementation of CRS' signature gender approach, The Faithful House. After receiving individualized counseling on the merits of joint decision-making, participating couples report improved income management and reduced household violence.

Building strong partnerships with collaboration and support

CRS works closely with governments, civil society organizations, the private sector and research organizations to create lasting solutions to poverty and injustice. Placing partnership at the core of its programming in Burundi, CRS puts a specific emphasis on working with counterparts in the relevant government ministries at the national, provincial and local levels. While joint supervision in the field encourages sustained support for vulnerable communities. participation in sectoral working groups enables shared learning for national influence. In 2017, CRS partnered with the Muyinga Provincial Office for the Environment, Agriculture and Livestock to combat a fall armyworm infestation which helped inform a national action plan. Additionally, in 2019, the Ministry of Human Rights, Social Affairs and Gender validated CRS' The Faithful House approach to be scaled up for country-wide replication due to its demonstrated success.
