Equipping caregivers with age-appropriate techniques such as singing, reading and playing with colorful objects stimulates young minds and sets children on a path toward success. For just 50





cents per child per year, we can help millions of children around the world build the resilience necessary to overcome the most damaging effects of violence and poverty which are threatening to rob them of their God-given potential. I strongly urge readers to reach out to our area representatives, Katie Hill and Julia Brownley, to encourage them to become original cosponsors of this important and bipartisan legislation.

Imagine what would happen if we channeled just 10% of our attention to issues that bring us together rather than the issues that divide us? In this case, we might just significantly improve the quality of life for years to come for millions of children around the world.
